National Measurement Institute Response

GAMAA has received a response from the National Measurement Institute (NMI) in regards to pressure markings on gas components, specifically if the National Measurement Act 1960 (the ACT) applied where units of measurement other than Australian Legal Units of Measurement (ALUMs) were used. The NMI recommends and supports the use of ALUMs where ever possible.

Specifically the relevant sections of the Act are as follows:

Section 10 of the Act requires that were a measurement of a physical quantity is made for any legal purpose it must be traceable to Australian primary standards of measurement and as such, must be made in terms of ALUMs.

Section 12 of the Act requires that where measurements of physical quantities are made as part of trade contracts that those measurements are made in terms of ALUMs.

In both cases, the Act requires the use of ALUMs in the *measurement of physical quantities*. However the marking of a unit of measurement on a gas component does not necessarily involve the *measurement of a physical quantity*. As such, reasonable interpretation would be that the Act does not prevent the use of non-ALUMs in the marking of gas components. This conclusion arises from the fact that the use of a particular unit of measurement in the marking of a gas component is separate and distinct from the *measurement of a physical quantity* in terms of the unit of measurement.
