2017 - a popular year for LPG in New Zealand

2017 was a successful year for the LPG industry in New Zealand, as it saw the highest sales ever recorded, with 45kg cylinders experiencing the most growth.

"This is significant to the industry. With just over 180,000 tonnes of LPG sold to both the residential and commercial sectors, the last time we saw numbers even remotely close to that was 2006/07 at 178,000 tonnes," according to the president of the LPG Association of New Zealand (LPGA), Graham Hardie.

According to Graham, the link between the LPG industry and building and construction plays a huge part in the LPG sales increase.

"The LPG industry has kept up with that demand and suppliers have been able to increase their sources of LPG and meet the demand of the market domestically."

Part of that is the increased awareness of efficiency that LPG provides in the home.

"I think when you compare LPG to electricity, the efficiency of LPG with water heating and appliances is significant.

"Domestic users appreciate that when you use LPG, you only pay for the energy you use. When you turn the tap on that's when you start paying for the gas. This is good for to consumers, when they compare LPG to electrical storage systems."

Graham says commercial users are a growing market segment for the LPG industry.

"Commercial users are now more aware of LPG as an alternative fuel source that is reliable and accessible.

"The trend is extremely exciting for the LPG market, and I look forward to watching it continue." Read article <u>here</u>
